ORGANIZATION'S BRIEF


PHALS is a Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) founded in Cox's Bazar by a young social workers group in 1992. PHALS works mainly to empower the poor and marginalized communities through involving various committees and providing capacity-building initiatives. To attain its Goal, PHALS offers various opportunities for children such as quality education, health facilities and IGA opportunities for women, child Protection linking with sector and GOB line departments, Livelihood on disaster Resilience, Promotion of human rights /Refugee Rights, especially on livelihood for the dignity of vulnerable people both Host and Rohingya community. In addition, PHALS has emphasized the end of violence against women and child Conservation. The Organization has the capacity for undertaking several activities like issue-based projects/programs, research, good governance, workshops, seminars, and advocacy on several crucial steps which contributed to the betterment of Cox's Bazar-lagged peoples. By this time, it obtained recognition from the government and other networks and proved its potential to achieve the organizational objectives very successfully. Moreover, PHALS actively participated in the wellfare/ development of the Rohingya community after the influx in 2017. On the other hand, PHALS has also held a good reputation for both district and local administration. Currently, it is operating a multi-sectorial project in different parts of Cox's Bazar District.



OUR ONGOING PROJECTS

PRE PRIMARY EDUCATION

Objective:

Education is the key component to creating a better nation to increase the literacy rate to reasonable percentages. This pre- education program is especially for those children whose ages are below 6 and lack of access to education system. They become ready to enroll in school upon having the necessary preparation with their eligibilty for this school. This is an elementary school where children learn through a process of playing in a pleasant environment and learning alphabetic knowledge along with fellow children.



Study time

Partner/Donor:

Hope network and PHALS members'

Location:

Cox's Bazar district both urban and rural areas.

Main Activities:

To create interest in education among the poor children by enrolling them in the local primary school under the supervision of 10 teachers. Pre school Education has been provided to 326 children through 10 education centers. Each school is run by one teacher and an average student 35 per school. The name of PHALS pre-primary school is Nozomi, Suzuran, Suzugamin, Hope, Samaria 1, Samaria 2, Samaria 3, Bondhu, Join's Family and Samaria 4.



Pre-Primary Students & Teacher

Outcome:

In the year 2022 maintaining through all necessary measures, three hundred twenty six students (boys 150 and girls 176) are continue pre primary education through ten pre School Centers at various location of Khuruskul. Tetuiya of Cox Bazar Sadar sub district, Chaindha Kawarkhup and Monirjhil of sub-district. In each class there were 35 students given direct education, coaching and phychosocial support in order to assist childrens development in the area of cognitive and psycho-social development. PHALS suppported these students with teaching-related meterials.

Stationery for students, and salaries for teachers. In 2022, the passing rate is 96% and enrollment in primary school rate 95%. The students enrolled in different Govt and Non Government schools and institution after the completion of the pre-primary school examination.



Challenge:

In 2021, due to COVID-19, parents were reluctant to enroll boys and girls in school. In 2022, It has softened again. Heavy rains were not far behind.

Overcome:

Attempts have been made to conduct teaching activities by redacting the attendance of students in compliance with health rules.

Educational activities have been confirmed through home visits and phone conversation with students and parents and relation between PHALS and the parents have been increased.

PHALS TAYAMA PRIMARY EDUCATION



Study time in the classroom

Objectives:

To decrease the dropout, rate up to a reasonable percentage as far as primary education is concern. The main target group is vulnerable poor children. They are supported with all kinds of educational materials and school dress to overcome their obstacle in the field of education. The education support is given the free cost for the children. The experienced teachers are providing education to the students.

Partner/Donor:

Own Funded

Location:

Bypass Road, Jhilongja, Cox's Bazar.

Main Activities:

PHALS Provides all necessary educational meterials for poor students. Six teachers are continuing this school with utmost dedication. Commitment and excellent education quality. They teach through "learning with fun" methodology and teaching techniques. This school provides a joyful environment for children.

Outcome:

From December to January 2022, 132 Students have been admitted to the school. 50 male students and 82 femail students. In 2021 many students passed the exam and got admission in high school.

Challenge:

Due to financial difficulties in the covid-19,2021 situation. Many parents have turned their children towards earning, which has resulted in declining students enrollment.

Overcome:

In the covid 19 situation teachers tried their best to visit the children's homes. The teachers highlight the importance of education to the parents, as a result of which the number of students was increased and it was possible to meet the challenges and relationships with parents has been increased.

PHALS-BANI ACADEMY CENTER

About the Project:

The project has the potential and impact-full of mainstreaming orphans and street children. Their basic needs are met & they will get new life through gaining knowledge, vocational skills, and life skills. They will get love and affection like parents. It will boost their confidence. They will become good assets to the community. They are developed physically & psychologically & made as a good & protective citizen. By being observed in philanthropy and social activities they will also be like that in the longer future.

Project duration: July 2020 to June 2023

Project Coverage Area: Cox`s Bazar Sadar

Project Manpower: 14 staff

Project Objectives:

- To provide orphan/semi orphan/street children, a childhood that they never experienced and help them to become useful members of society.
- To encourage orphan/semi orphan/street children to kind their potential by pro viding creative opportunities.
- To make available a secure place where orphan/semi orphan/street children can play and enjoy their childhood.
- To provide basic education to orphan/semi orphan/street children.
- To provide such welfare services as free lodging, boarding, health, and recreation.
- To provide basic literacy and facilities for those who wish to study further.
- To select and prepare for a vacation to live on their legs.
- To accomplish physical, intellectual, and aesthetic development of the children.

Main Activities:

BANI STREET has expertise in the accompaniment and support of minors in a situation of precariousness in cox`s Bazar. The goal is not to provide one-time emergency assistance but rather to offer personalized assistance that is global and sustainable. With the opening of this structure, BANI STREET and PHALS aim to reduce the number of abuses on Bangladeshi children at risk by contributing to the change in mentality and establishing a structure ensuring their protection. The structure is expected to accommodate up to 48 Bangladeshi children under optimal conditions ensuring their development in a safe environment. Children will be admitted between the age of 6 and 14, and they could be taken care of until the age of 23.



Outcome:

32 children where girls 24, and 8 boys, staying at PHALS-BANI Academy shelter home are being provided with all facilities including food and shelter through the activities of the project. All children are studying in different classes from 1 to 12 class. All children did good results in the annual exam this year. Among the disadvantaged students studying at PHALS-Bani Academy who participated in the Three highest national level Taekwondo tournament in the "Korea Ambassador's Taekwondo Championship Cup 2022" held on June 22, winning 17 Medals including 4 gold, 6 silver, and 7 bronze in the junior category Girls event. Academy children also achieved 21 Medals(6 gold, 4 silver,11 Bronze) at another two events later in the year "20th Senior / Junior National Taekwondo Competition" and "Victory day Taekwondo championship` 22" which was held in Dhaka on 26-30 December 2022.

Education:

At present there are 32 children PHALS-BANI Academy. The children are admitted to Cox's Bazar International school. They get a very good and standard education there. They also take part in extra-curriculer activities there. There are two residential assistants and three tutors in PHALS-BANI Academy. The English teacher and the science teacher teach children 6 hours a day, 6 days a week, according to class routine. Special classes of Spoken English are also conducted by the English teacher. Religion teacher teaches religious issues. Three students, Josna, Riya Moni and Rekha are in higher secondary level. Previously, Josna obtained the highest score -GPA 5 in her SSC exam.

Nuraja is an SSC examinee this year. She is studying in Business Studies group. Rajia is in class 10 now. She studies in science group. There are four students in class 9 now. They were in class 8 last year. Among them, Shahina and Tania have scored GPA 5 in their last annual exam. The other two students Sadia and Jesmin have also made a good result.

Ria moni was in class 7 last year. She is studying in class 8 now. She has improved a lot in her study. Shahed who came to PHALS-BANI Academy last year is in class 8 now. She has stood first in his last annual exam. Maliya was in class 6 last year. She is now in class 7. Shifadul Islam is also in class 7 this year.

Three students have been promoted from class 5 to class 6. They are Ruma, Tanha & Mobina. They have made a good result in last annual exam. Four students, Shamsunnahar, Nargis, Munni & Shahid are now in class 5. Akila is in class 4 now. Sumaiya, Adiba & Rishat are in class three now. They have made a good result in last annual exam. Fazilatunnesa, Reshmi, Alvi, Ares, Jihad & Sami are also in class 3. They came to PHALS-BANI Academy last year. Among them, Fazilatunnesa & Reshmi have made excellent result in last annual exam.

The youngest students of PHALS-BANI Academy are Kulsuma and Tasfia. They are now in class 2. They have learnt to read and write quite well after coming to PHALS-BANI Academy.



Food

Children is residing in PHALS - BANI Academy homes are provided with healthy and nutritious food. A separate food timetable is prepared based on the liking of the children and also considering the health of the children. Once a week beef is cooked for the children. Moreover, in the evening the children are given seasonal fruits which give them good health. Every day the children are provided snacks as per the food timetable in the evening.

Medical Support

PHALS-BANI Academy provides medical assistance in addition to other support. The two resident assistants took constant care. If any of the children fell sick, we immediately consulted the doctor on duty at the FPAB clinic nearest to the academy. And take medicines as advised. facilitators make sure they are followed up in the coming days. In special cases, have been referred to a specialized adjacent doctor. The facilitators are always ready to extend their support for any medication they need with the expert.

So far almost all the children of the center have been checked by the doctor with their physical problems. And the necessary treatment has been provided.

Victory day

On 16-12-2022 at Cox's Bazar Birshrestha Ruhul Amin Stadium on the occasion of Great Victory Day 22, the children of PHALS-BANI Academy successfully participated in the parade and display program organized by Cox's Bazar District Administration by performing Taekwondo display for the first time. In the event, PHALS-BANI Academy won third place in the secondary display category by competing with various reputed schools of Cox's Bazar. The honorable District Commissioner of Cox's Bazar district was present as the chief guest, along with special guests honorable District Police Superintendent, and dignitaries of the district. More than 50 schools of Cox's Bazar participated in the Great Victory Day parade and display.

The children of PHALS-BANI Academy, an integrated service center for underprivileged children, brought 21 Medals (6 gold, 4 silver, and 11 Bronze) to the residents of Cox's Bazar. National Level Victory Day Taekwondo Competition 2022 held in Dhaka on 30 December 5 gold, 4 silver, and 4 Bronze medals as a gift for the people of Cox's Bazar by the boys and girls of the academy Earlier in the National Taekwondo Competition 2022 held from 26/12/2022 - 29-12-2022 the Academy girls won 1 gold and 7 bronze medals.

In junior category Girls event Academy children also achived 17 Medals(4 gold, 6 silver, 7 Bronze) In 4 Gold (Taniya -1, Somiya-2, Abida-1,), in 6 Silver (Sadia-2,Sahina-1,Rista-2,Alvi-1)and in 7 Bronze Medals (Rumana-2, Jesmin-1, Riya-1, Rekha-1, Taniya-1, Rajia-1).PHALS family members are really proud of our children. First Secretary of Korean Embassy to Bangladesh distributed the Prizes among the participants.

BASIC LITERACY PROJECT (64 District)

Objective

To make Bangladesh free from illiteracy, the Government of Bangladesh is implementing the "Basic Literacy Project (64 District)" under the Ministry of Primary and Mass Education and Bureau of Non-Formal Education.

Partner: BNFE- GoB.

Duration: 1st August 2019-30 June 2022

Project Coverage

PHALS is implementing the program in Pekua Upazilla, Cox'sBazar out of 250 Upazilas. In this project maintain 300 learning centers to lead 18,000 learners (beneficiaries with a team of 600 teachers and 15 supervisors).



Book Distribution Programme

Main Activities

PHALS has selected 18000 illiterate men and women aged 15-45 from 7 unions of Pekua Upazila through a baseline survey and recruited 600 teachers (300 women and 300 men) & 15 supervisors to implement this program. At present training activities of teachers & supervisors are going on. In October 2019 the teachers and supervisors were selected and trained by BNFE. They Surveyed 24000 illiterate people from Pekua Upazila by the baseline survey out of 24000 illiterates 18,000 are selected for 300 centers. All of our centers are moderated by 2 shifts - male & Female.

Due to Covid -19, the project started in December 2021 according to (BNFE) circular. Project activities such as class, monitoring, etc. are continuing. Books, exercise books, pen, blackboard, signboard, eraser, floor mat, light, chalk, etc. are disbursed into the learning center in time properly. There are 300 CMC, 7 ULC, and a UNFE committee in our project area.

CAPACITATING LOCAL NGOs IN COX'S BAZAR

Partner: Start Network Bangladesh **Duration:** 1st Nov 2022 to 30 Nov 2032

About Project:

The START Fund Bangladesh is a rapid, flexible pooled fund that offers timely financing for people at risk of and affected by small to medium scale crises. It is collectively owned and managed by its 47 member agencies, including 27 local and national NGOs who have equal participation in the decision making and access to funds. START Fund Bangladesh (SFB) initiated strengthening the capacity of local humanitarian agencies operating in Cox's Bazar.

In turn, this will expand PHALS organizations' learnings and abilities to act independently, create more opportunities for participation in humanitarian forums and increase scope of accessing more direct humanitarian funding. By strengthening PHALS organization, support for affected communities will no longer rely on the presence of International Non-Governmental Organization and will be more sustainable, thus catalyzing a humanitarian system which is locally led, and better protecting local communities from suffering and harm. EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS RESPONSE FOR FDMN & HOST COMMUNITIES IN COX'S BAZAR

In 2021 there has been heavy rainfall in Cox's Bazar causing a series of casualties more or less in all nine Upazilas in Cox's Bazar. Due to heavy rainfall, landslide, flood flash, and hilly slope rainwater, there is a reported around 20 people (Rohingya-6) lost lives in Ukhiya, Teknaf, and other parts of Coxs'Bazar both host and Rohingya communities. Along with living casualties, cultivated land, poultry firm, orchards, fish fonds, embankments, roads, bridges, construction,

tube wells, food, and houses have been affected in host communities. In Rohingya camps 6418 shelters have been destroyed, walls collapsed, bridges, tube wells, displaces, and shortage of drinking water are emerging. In response to the flood flash affected people, PHALS funded by Malteser International and Aktion Deutschland Hilft supports them through distributing hygiene kits to 400 young women in Rohingya camp-19 and Cash support to 250 HH in Cox's Bazar Sadar Upazila, 130HH Palongkhali and 120 HH in Whykong Union at Ukhiya and Teknaf Upazila under the Emergency Flood Response for Rohingya and Host Community in Cox's Bazar project. The Project Duration was from 12/8/2021 to 30/11/2021 (3.5 months). The targeted groups are Rohingyas and Host Community in Cox's Bazar district those who were affected during the last flood flash under Ukhiya and Teknaf Upazila. Among the total beneficiaries, 44.44% are the Rohingyas community and 56% are the host community. Among the host community Cox'sbaar Sadar Upazila, beneficiaries are 50%, Ukhiya Upazila 26%, and Teknaf Upazila beneficiaries are 24%. Receive permission from Deputy Commissioner to implement the project. Beneficiaries list collection from the local authority of the Union level by Volunteers. Conducted need assessment survey based on local authority-provided beneficiaries list. The beneficiary list was finalized by the SMT meeting. Based on the assessed database, the mode of cash delivery method is finalized in the SMT Meeting.



Share the final beneficiaries list with respective UP Chairmen and local authorities, UNOs and enforcement received to deliver the services. Concern person contracts the mobile agencies and delivered the cash or distributed the cash as per SMT meeting decisions. Under this project, the Post distribution Monitoring and reporting were also conducted. Rohingya Community Have Informed RRRC about the project, Received Need Assessment by CIC, and taken Permission to implement the project in Camp-19. After getting the Permission to distribute the Kits in Camp-19 from CIC, Procure the Kits as per the procurement process and distribute the Kits among Rohingya beneficiaries by volunteer's assistance and supervised by CIC. Emergency Flood Response for Rohingya and Host Community project in Cox's Bazar.

STAY AT HOME, SAFE AT HOME, LEARN AT HOME

About Project:

Street Child UK (206-208 Strewart's Road, London, England, SW8 4U) international organization intended to implement its "Stay at Home, Safe at Home, Learn at Home" project with the PHALS organization. As per agreement with Street Child-UK, PHALS implemented its 1st Phase from January 2022 to June 2022 successfully. After completion its 1st Phase, PHALS has taken necessary steps to implement the 2nd Phase from July 2022 to December 2022. The 1st Phase started its project in Camp-19, Thaingkhali, Ukhiya, Bazar which budgeted amount was BDT 9,07,000.

Finally, PHALS received approval from RRRC to operate it. Considering camp feasibility CIC of Camp-19 supporting one Learning Center named ROSE LEARNING CENTER in Block-C4 which was earlier operated by World Vision.

At present 90 FDMN students are receiving education in 2 grades consisting 50 students (Boys-24 and Girls-26) in Grade-1 and 40 students (Boys-20, Girls-20) Level-2 (20 boys 20 girls=40 students), facilitated by two Teachers, one FDMN Teacher and another one host community Teacher. To look after and assist the Learning Center one Security Guard was recruited. Students are receiving high energy biscuit from WFP and Myanmar Curriculum Books from UNICEF through ISCG Education Sector. During July-December 2022 at the 2nd phase of the project the approved budget is BDT 6,35,393.

As per demand of local authority to implement minimum 25% of the total project budget in host community, PHALS has conducted two major events viz. training on Safeguarding and Beneficiaries Feedback Mechanism and Awareness session on Social Psychology for 7 Pre-primary School student in Ramu Upazila of Cox's Bazar.



Major activities accomplished:

- Learning Centre Renovation (Signboard, Solar, Fan, Light, Terpal etc)
- Learning Centre Wash facility renovation (Water tank, School Bag distribution for the 90 LC student's)
- Learning materials, decoration (Board, marker, paper, banner)
- Covid-19 precautionary materials (mask, hand sanitizer, soap) for 200 students
- Bi-monthly awareness meeting with 90 parents for Rohingya and Host community
- Awareness session on Social Psychology for 250 students
- Education & sports materials for 250 students of Host community
- Street Child Education, Safeguarding and BFM Training for 250 students of Host community

Challenges:

During the project period January–December 2022, the implementing partner PHALS has faced many challenges as follows: -

- New construction building as Learning Center or other related infrastructure was not allowed in the camp area.
- Movement restriction in the camp area.
- As there is no project office in camp area or nearby, so to follow up from the head office it is time consuming and expensive.
- In Camp area as everything is controlled by CIC office, so for taking any initiative it requires prior permission from CIC.
- Due to delay fund receiving it has to face many challenges to implement many activities and made delayed.
- Minimum 25% budget/activities allocation for host community is required to get approval from LA (DC) and had to bargain with Donor for it.

The targeted group will get different Technical support both kinds & cash in different intervention to enhance their existing indigenous capacity / knowledge.

Objective of the project:

To Increase the level of people's participation in Local level development planning for sustaining wellbeing amongst fellow people irrespective of Gender, PWD, Sex, ethnicity and religion thus improved their living status by 2022 of influx affected poor Host community of Palongkhali & Jaliapalong and Whykon Unions under Ukhiya & Teknaf Upazila/Sub district.

Project Outcomes:

Outcome 1: Well functioned and empowered people and local communities/initiative taking their own development initiative and ensure appropriate services to Community and contributed toward their own economic development thus enhance trust, mutual respect, and unity amongst themselves.

Project Key Activities Area and Achievement:

The project contains 60 activities of its 3 major components; 28 activities in Social Cohesion & Community Development, 26 activities in Gender Mainstreaming & Disability Inclusion and 6 activities in Disaster Risk Reduction. Some of its key activities' achievements are narrated below:



Training on Community Poliching

Training for community police to stop community violence and play vital role to promote social cohesion.

On June and 31st August 2022 "Training for Community Police to stop community violence and play vital role to promote Social Cohesion" arranged at Ukhiya, Jaliapalong and Cafe Asfa, BGB Check post at the village Whykong of Whykong Union under Teknaf Upazila. A total number of 86 participants (Male-76, Female-10) attend in the training from all 9 wards of the respective union. General Secretary of Teknaf Upazila Community Police, President and General Secretary, Union

Community Police forum members along with Secretary were present in the training session.

Topics of the training session were as follows-

- o Activities and Responsibilities of Community Police
- o Role of Community Police to reduce social violence, and
- o Open Discussion



Roles and Responsibilities of Community Police/Plan:

- Community police works against Early Marriage, Dowry and drug
- Assists Police by providing kidnapping information to police
- Aware general people not to involve with drug selling and drinking
- Aware people by providing violence prevention related message before KHUTBAH on each JUMAH
- Drug prevention related message publicity
- Provide information to Anti-corruption department against the smugglers
- Don't involve drug professions in social activities

In this way Community violence will stop and it will play vital role to promote Social Cohesion.

Organizing agricultural fair through Farmers Club:

On the 20th June and 28th September 2022 Agriculture Fair arranged at Palongkhali, Tulatoli Monirghona of Whykong union Teknaf, Cox's Bazar. Upazila Agriculture Officer of DAE Ukhiya & Teknaf was the Chief Guest of the fair and UP Chairman of both the union presided over the program at their respective union. Brac Program Manager-Partnership, Sr. District Manager, SAAO, School Teacher, Journalists were present as the special guests. A Total of 362 Participants (M-172, F-190) attend in the Fair. DAE, 4 Nursery, 3 Female group and one Male CBO along with HARHCB project, a total of 10 stall's prepared in the fair. One Farmer's corner were also prepared to show farmers best products.









Agriculture Fair



Social Action Project (SAP) implementation (10Projects up to BDT 50,000 each, three months duration) (combat early marriage, nature, crime, drug smuggling and trafficking, and bio-diversity conservation, etc.):

On the 18th September and 26th October 2022 Social Action Projects cheque with an amount of Tk. 50,000 (Fifty Thousand) handed over to 10 CBOs (Palongkhali-3, Jaliapalong-3 and Whykong-4) among 218 beneficiaries (M-204, F-14) through master roll signed by the president/secretary of the CBO. Prior to this CBOs submitted project proposal endorse through UP representative with the assistance of Field Facilitator. Account Payee cheque against their CBO bank account. The projects are Early marriage, Nature, Crime, Drug smuggling and Trafficking, and Bio-diversity conservation. CBOs will maintain register for all expenses and also maintain attendance sheet for all awareness session with session/event picture and short video clips (if possible) and send to PHALS as reference documents.

Homestead and vertical gardening with Assistance of club/samity/-women group/Household in rural area (30×BDT-25,000):

On the 19th September 2022 Homestead and vertical gardening cash assistance have been provided to 57 groups among 571 beneficiaries (M-10, F-561). Group Leaders name already been endorsed by the respective UP Chairman before distribution of the amount. Each group received 25,000 TK (Twenty Five Thousand) through Master Roll signed by the group leader/president. MOU also has been signed between PHALS and Group Leader where the group members and UP representative put their signature as witness of the MOU.



Homestead & Vertical Gardening

The group members will use the amount for vegetable production purposes input cost such as Seed/Seedling purchasing, Land Leasing, Fertilizer purchasing, Bamboo/net purchasing for fencing, stalking of the garden to protect it from livestock. For technical support group members will communicate with their respective Sub Assistant Agriculture Officer (SAAO) and if available NGO service provider as well.

Small-scale quick impact livelihood interventions to promote income generation, food security, and skill-based development opportunities. (Training and inputs/assets):

On the 19th and 20th October 2022 four batches training on Poultry & Goat rearing and Homestead vegetable production held at Thaingkhali Project Office, Jaliapalong Team Office under Ukhiya

Upazila and Café Asfa, BGB Checkpost, Whykong under Teknaf Upazila. A total of 100 participants (M-1, F-99) received the training. The training conducted by Sub Assistant Livestock Officer (SALO) of DLS and Sub Assistant Agriculture Officer (SAAO) of DAE. The training contents were as follows:



- Poultry and Goat rearing in small scale. Its financial importance and role in poverty elevation
- Selection of Improved species, rearing shelter and feed management
- Disease, disease control, vaccination and marketing
- Vegetable production in small scale. Its financial importance and role in poverty elevation
- Seasonal Improved varieties and its cultivation process
- Fertilizer management, Pest and disease control/management
- Vegetable harvesting and Marketing

As per the training participates consent- they received some technical information, able to link with the respective GoB service providing department which will help them to get better management, better production and ultimately, they will be profited more.

For small scale quick impact livelihood support trained 100 participants (Palongkhali-34, Jaliapalong-33 and Whykong-33) received 20,000 Tk in cash. Prior to the cash distribution staff members ensured find out beneficiaries' goat, cow, poultry, grocery items for purchasing from their community and on the distribution date the community people borrowed it to the distribution point and the beneficiaries bought it just after getting the cash amount in front of UP representatives.

After getting amendment of agreement 5 Lac taka Brac management approved 55 participants quick impact livelihood support with an amount of Tk. 10,000 per participants for the mentioned intervention. After conducting survey we finalized the beneficiaries 28 from Palongkhali Union and 27 from Whykong Union that endorsed by the respective UP Chairman.

For this small scale quick impact livelihood support all the beneficiaries received 10,000 Tk in cash. Prior to the cash distribution staff members ensured find out beneficiaries goat, poultry, grocery items as per their requirement for purchasing from their community and on the distribution date the community people borrowed it to the distribution point and the beneficiaries bought it just after getting the cash amount in front of UP representatives.

Community mobilization and sensitization about maintenance of community infrastructure small scale:

Three CBOs from the three unions (CBO-Serung Statin sporting club, Jaliapalong, Telkhola Young star club, Palongkhali and Kanjorpara Auto Rice meal Jubo Kallyan Parishad, Whykong) are provided a grant of Tk. 50,000.00 for the development of the infrastructure small scale on the date of 30 June 2022. The total of members of the 3 CBOs are 274 (M- 274, F-0) Graveyard and west Pannasia road of ward no-01 of Jaliapalong union will be afforested. Manik members shop to crematorium total 450 feet road of ward no-6 of Palongkhali union will be renovated by CBO Telkhola Young Star Club. Kanjorpara Auto Rice Mil, Station road kalvart of ward no-5 of Whykong union will be reformed by CBO Kanjorpara Auto Rice Mil Jubo Kallyan Parishad Whykong union. As a result, the people of the area will be benefited and will have a positive impact on the overall development of CBOs.

Referral service for mediation and Legal Aid through the appropriate organization for the GBV Victims, case management:



Cheque distribution

For this at first we raised the issue in Family Welfare and Household conflict resolution related UP standing committee meeting. They find out some GBV victims. Project staff members talked with the victims, verified their documents and selected one victim from each union, send them to referring service providing agencies. Then after getting referral form from the referring service providing organizations with recommendation, collected the concern UP standing committees recommendation related required documents by the victim along with Bank account

information. Finally Nine GBV victims has been selected from 3 unions through these process who received 10.000 Tk Cheque against their bank account on June and 18th September 2022.

It helped the destitute GBV victims to maintain their legal service expenses.

Facilitating Gender Champion of men and boys to demonstrate positive role in addressing and reporting on violence against women and children (VAWC) and gender norms change:

On the 16th June and 12th October 2022 "Facilitating Gender Champion of men and boys to demonstrate positive role in addressing and reporting on violence against women and children (VAWC) and gender norms change" arranged at Whykong Union Parishad, Jaliapalong Union Parishad and Mahadi Mansion, Thaingkhali of Palongkhali. UP Chairman, Member, Local Community Leaders helps to select the Champions and were present in the discussion and award giving session.

A total of 59 (M-51, F-8) participants were present in the session. Gender Champion facilitating session presided over by the UP Chairman of Palongkhali Union and UP Women Member of Jaliapalong Union. 5 Men & 5 Boys were selected as Gender Champion from each union.

UP Chairman, Member and Community leaders appreciated PHALS and Brac for taking such types of initiatives to reduce violence against women & children (VAWC) and gender norms change. Also added that its our every one's moral duty but someone we obey it mostly didn't. Selected Gender Champion's expressed their opinion and committed to continue it for the violence free family and the society and regarding this they wants support from the UP representatives as well as community leaders. Gender Champions were awarded by crest handed over by the UP representatives and Project staff's.

Distribution of input/livelihood support to persons with disabilities who received skill based training:

On the 23rd June and 22nd September 2022 distributed Cash to 90 (M-53, F-37) Persons with Disabilities as input/livelihood support. Each Persons with Disabilities received 20,000 Tk from the project through master roll. Before distribution beneficiaries list has been endorsed by the respective UP Chairman. The distribution happened in presence of UP representatives. From the amount beneficiaries purchased Goats, Hens, Duck, Pigeon, Vegetable seeds/seedlings, Small business grocery items and some amount used for its management cost. Project staff's ensured to purchase it immediate after cash distribution from their or nearby community. Afterward received the support they are very happy and to Australian Aid, Brac and also to PHALS who are reached the support.

Assistive Device support/repair to persons with disabilities:

From project budget we procured 39 devices- Crutches-2, White Cane-1, Walking Sticks-9, Hearing Aids-7, and Wheel Chair-20 and Brac provided Crutches-5, Walking Sticks-9, Hearing Aids-5, and Wheel Chair-6 a total of 64 devices have been distributed to 64 Persons with Disabilities (M-45, F-19) assistive device to the Persons with Disabilities of Palongkhali union (13) of Ukhiya UZ, Whykong Union (26) of Teknaf Upazila and Jaliapalong Union (25-Only Brac supported devices) in presence of UP representatives. They are very much happy to get the devices. Some of them expressed so joy and laugh that charmed the distribution team members along with the attendance.

Maintenance and functional of Disability Learning and Development Centre (DLDC), developing DLDC centre functional guideline including Caretaker honorarium:

For providing care and mental support to the Persons with Disabilities one Female Counsellor hired for DLDC. She provided Counselling, mental and moral support at the DLDC and home visit.

Disabled persons were found very much happy to attend the counselling session as well as mental support.

Mini-grants support provided to Telkhola Protibondhi Kallyan Somitty, MaIjjabil, Palongkhali Union on June for small scale Poultry/duck farm distributed a cheque an amount of Tk. 50,000 and on the 26th October 2022 to "Dakhin Jummapara Lal Mohila Club, ward#1 of Jaliapalong union under Ukhiya Upazila.

In Ukhiya UZ we observed it with UZ administration and NGO/INGO's working in Ukhiya leaded by Ukhiya UZ Social Service Officer Mr. Al Mahmud. The program arranged in 3 steps-Rally, Discussion session and device distribution. UNO was the Chief Guest of the program.

In Union Level we observed it at Sonarpara High School of Jaliapalong Union and Balukhali, Jamidarpara of Palongkhali Union. Rally and discussion session arranged to observe the day at union level. A total of 236 Participants (M-158, F-78; Persons with disabilities 83 (M-55, F-28) of attend the program.

Capacity building of UzDMC, UDMCs and WDMC for Emergency Preparedness and Response (WDMC/UDMC) under P-FIM (People First Impact method) including Equipment Support UP):

In this reporting period Jaliapalong, Palongkhali and Whykong Union Disaster Management Committee arranged at all respective Union Parishad meeting room. A total of 90 (M-74, F-16) participants along with UP Chairman and Members attend the training session. The training session facilitated by Project Manager assisted by the Field facilitators of the project.



Capacity building session



The training session continued on the following topics:

- Basic concepts of Disaster and Disaster Risk
- Formation and Structure of Union Disaster Management Committee
- Roles and Responsibilities of UP Disaster management Committee
- Disaster Early warning and pre preparation
- Community Risk Assessment and Risk Reduction Planning
- Damage and Need Assessment form/formats

At the end of the training session Hand Mike, Torch Light, Gum Boot, Life Jacket, Rain Coat handed over to UDMC president UP Chairman as disaster management equipment.

Capacity development training of CPP volunteers/Existing Community Volunteer on First Aid, Early warning, Search and Rescue issues:

Capacity development training for Cyclone Preparedness Program (CPP) volunteers of Jaliapalong, Palongkhali and Whykong Union, A total of 76 (M-49, F-27) participants attend in the training session. The training session facilitated by Mr. ABM Abul Hossain (Raju), CPP Ukhiya UZ Team Leader as a resource person along with Project Manager and Field Facilitators of the project. The training session continued on the following topics:

- Disaster and Types of Disaster
- Primary concept of CPP
- Eligibility to be a member of CPP
- Field level committees of CPP
- Responsibilities of CPP
 - o Normal time
 - o During disaster First Aid for the victims, Search and Rescue
 - o Activities after disaster

Preposition of emergency response material and small scale mitigation Schemes:

3 small scale mitigation scheme implemented by 3 Cyclone Centre Management Committee from 3 union consisting 28 members (M-25, F-3).

Through the scheme they replaced water tank, repair/maintenance work for Cyclone Centre access road and they are very happy.



Project Key Learning Area:

- Arrange project activity, log-frame orientation, training for the project staff at the very beginning of the project and preparing necessary session guide, module & other necessary documents
- Rapport build up with project beneficiary, community people, local leader, UP representative, GO/NGO service provider enhance easy implementation of the project activity and in better quality
- Community/Social event/action increases cohesion among different race, age, religious, professions, men, women, youth, adolescent, boys, girls of the community and society.
- Device support to the Persons with Disabilities enhance their mobility by which they have got the opportunity to earn for their family, reduce dependency on others, able to participate in HH and Social activities
- Intensive follow up and guidance increase capacity of CBOs to facilitate community awareness related session like early marriage, dowry, gender base violence, drug smuggling and reducing it from the community.
- Delay activity planning and budgeting hampers implementation of the project activity. To overcome the situation, need to start next year planning in current year at least in the month of November.

Project Activities/contribution for SDG/Delta Plan/Vision 41:

- Training for community police to stop community violence and play vital role to promote social cohesion.
- Strengthening UP standing Committee
- Social Action Project (SAP) implementation through community level planning by CBO (combat early marriage, nature, crime, drug smuggling and trafficking, and bio-diversity conservation, etc.)
- Homestead and vertical gardening by the women group with Assistance of club/samity/women group/Household in rural area
- Small-scale quick impact livelihood interventions to promote income generation, food security, and skill-based development opportunities for the vulnerable people
- Community mobilization and sensitization about maintenance of community infrastructure small scale
- Referral service for mediation and Legal Aid through the appropriate organization for the GBV Victims, case management
- Facilitating Gender Champion of men and boys to demonstrate positive role in addressing and reporting on violence against women and children (VAWC) and gender norms change
- Distribution of input/livelihood support to persons with disabilities who received skill based training
- Assistive Device support/repair to persons with disabilities and Mini-grants provision for DPOs and WROs to build organizational capacity
- Capacity building of UzDMC, UDMCs and WDMC for Emergency Preparedness and Response (WDMC/UDMC) under P-FIM (People First Impact method) including Equipment Support UP)
- Capacity development training of CPP volunteers/Existing Community Volunteer on First Aid, Early warning, Search and Rescue issues

Conclusion:

This project continued for three years from July 2020 to November 2022. In this last year in Social Cohesion and Community Development component project participants involved in meeting, Awareness raising session, Dialogue, Campaign, Agriculture Fair, Community level planning through PRA system, CBO strengthening, Small scale quick impact livelihood support, Homestead/vertical gardening, Small scale infrastructure development through CBOs.

In Gender Mainstreaming and Disability Inclusion project beneficiaries took part in meeting, Awareness raising session, Dialogue, Campaign, Day observation, Rally, Discussion session, Device Distribution, Disability organization establish and providing support for its strengthening, Providing Skill base training and livelihood support. Disability Learning and Development Center.

And in DRR part provided support for Community resilience through Cyclone Center WASH Facility repair/maintenance, Mitigation Scheme-Culvert repair/maintenance, Access Road repair, Flood response support, Early warning/disaster management equipment/Kits along with training, Community Level UDMC/WDMC/CPP Capacity building Training, Day observation, Sapling distribution.

In Organization Development part this project helped a lot for its policies review, develop and its accountability part along with different capacity development initiatives.

Through these multi-dimensional activities, the project increasingly ensures the engagement of other community groups like Local youths with a view to building their capacity (Critical Thinking/Problem Solving, Communication, Ownership, Leadership, Interpersonal Skills, Personal and Social values, Ethics, Curiosity, Emotional intelligence Self-motivated, High energy/positive attitude, Team player, Citizenship, reading habit, Management Skills, etc.). Therefore, it is expected to raise a sense of ownership and belongingness to the project beneficiaries and community actors about the interventions taken under the project. These local youth leader and CBOs leaders linked with local government and government service providing department. Therefore, CBOs and local government institutions take over the role of local development with support from PHALS. One CBO already got registrations from Youth Development department and some others are on process for getting it from the local authority . Youth Development Affaires Social Welfare Affair, Women Affair etc.

Small scale quick impact livelihood support, Homestead/vertical gardening support, Device distribution, GBV referral support to the vulnerable HH, local level infrastructure development, mitigation scheme and Social Action project implement by the CBOs appreciated by the project beneficiaries, Community people, Local leaders, UP bodies, Reporters, Civil Societies, Government service providers and Donors.

Taniya Akter (15) is the eldest child of a farmer, Mr. Nurul Kabir. Her mother is a housewife. Taniya has a brother and 4 sisters. With a poor income, her father cannot maintain the family properly. When Taniya was in class two, her study was about to end due to financial crisis. The condition of all her siblings was the same. So, Taniya started to go to sea-beach everyday to sell oyster ornaments. She used to return home at 10 pm which is unsafe for a girl. In this way, she got a very little time for study. After three years, her father left his family and married another woman. Then he stopped spending money for Taniya's family. Taniya's life became even more uncertain. She continued to sell oyster ornaments on the sandy beach under hot sun all day long. Despite facing adverse situations, Taniya is not a girl to give up. Somehow BANI Academy representative knew about Taniya and visited her home. BANI Academy offered Taniya's mother the responsibility of Taniya's education. Taniya became very happy. She was brought to BANI Academy

and admitted to class four in Cox's Bazar International School in 2018. She became very attentive to her studies and also excelled in co-curricular activities. She has made a good result in every exam. She has also got a gold and a silver medal in National Taekwondo Competition held in Dhaka recently. She can speak & write English well. She Says-

"I'm grateful to Allah for getting a chance to continue my study by the help of BANI Academy. I want to be a pilot in future. I want to travel more and more countries. I pray for the donor Moussa Ibn Yacoub, PHALS-BANI Academy and PHALS team."

Riya Moni:

Riya Moni (18) is the eldest child of a day-laborer, Mr. Nurul Islam. Her mother is a housewife. Riya has a brother. With a poor income, her father cannot maintain the family properly. When Riya was in class three, her study was about to end due to financial crisis. The condition of her brother was the same. So, Riya started to go to sea-beach everyday to sell oyster ornaments. She used to return home at 10 pm which is unsafe for a girl. In this way, she got a very little time for study. Riya's life became even more uncertain when her brother got injured in a road accident. The family suffered financial crisis badly. So, Riya continued to sell oyster ornaments on the sandy beach under hot sun all day long. Despite facing adverse situations, Riya is not a girl to give up. Somehow BANI Academy representative knew about Riya and visited her home. BANI Academy offered Riya's mother the responsibility of Riya's education. Riya became very happy. She was brought to PHALS-BANI Academy and admitted to class seven in Cox's Bazar International School in 2016.

Anis Khan wants to be a good teacher after his study

Anis Khan, 8 years old who is a son of Mohamed Ayas and Mrs Roshida, is a learner of PHALS Rose Learning Center of Grade 02. Beginning of the year 2022, he was a student of World Vision operated learning center. Suddenly the World Vision learning center was closed in 19 March 2022 which was funded by UNICEF. In the meantime, PHALS organization funded by Street Child applied to RRRC for running one Learning Center in Camp-19. As per project allocation and approval, PHALS had budget to build learning center newly but during that time there was a decision from RRRC not to give permission for any new infrastructure for learning center and other programme; so, CIC of camp-19 allocated PHALS to operate one LC in camp-19 Block C-4. After March 2022. Without school, Anis was

rooming here and there in day time. Without education, he had also loosed his hope that he can continue his education and when PHALS launched its project "Stay at Home, Safe at Home, Learn at Home", he came to learning center and enrolled in level -2. From ROSE Learning Center he received new books of Myanmar Curriculum, education materials, nutritious biscuit. He comes to learning center regularly. Now he can read and write more clear than previous. He wants to be a smart learner from the PHALS operating Rose Learning Center, wants to be a good Teacher in future.

ROSE learning Center's Learner Rashefa wants to be a nurse

Rashefa is a learner of PHALS' ROSE Learning Center. She is Six (6) years old. Rashefas' father name is Sayed Ullah and monthers' name is Reasmin Fatema. In 2017, she along with her family members came to Bangaldesh from Myanmer when they were forcefully migrated into Bangladesh by Myanmar Govt. troops. Rashefa was a student of World Vision one year ago or last year in 2021. When World Vision learning center was closed in on 19/March/2022, she became helpless to resume her study. She got relieved when she became enrollment in ROSE Learning Center, Camp-19, Block C-4. Her enrolled number is 31, Grade-1. Since then she comes to Learning Center which is operated by PHALS funded by Street Chils, UK regularly. Now she wants to be a smart learner from the PHALS Rose Learning Center. "To become a nurse in future" is the only dream of Rashefa after her education.

"My Family Maintaining Machine is Sewing Machine" -Ruby Akhtar of Jaliapalong

Ruby Akhtar, age 33 years, father's name Rashid Ahmed and mother's name Rabeya Begum. She lives in the Village of Lombripara, ward # 2, Union-Jaliapalong, Upazila-Ukhia, District-Cox's Bazar. In 2006, she got married to Belal Uddin, the son of Bodiul Alam of Jaliya Palang Union, who lived in Jummapara, ward#1 in the same union. Their first year of marriage was blissful, in 2007 Ruby Akhtar became pregnant for the first time and the child died during delivery. Since then the inhuman torture on Ravi Akhtar started. In various ways, her husband kept pressuring Ruby Aktar to bring money from his father's house. He was always physically tortured because she could not bring money due to the poor financial condition of his father's house. And Bodiul Alam used to say Ruby Akhter, if you can't pay, then I will get married again. In this way, a few years passed.

Suddenly, in 2010, her husband Belal Uddin brought her home with the help of her parents for a second marriage. When Ruby Akhtar said something, she was beaten and her mother-in-law asks her to accept. Ruby Akhter also tries to accept. But her husband does not want to give her HH maintenance expenses. He humiliated her in various ways in front of her younger wife. In 2014, Rubi Akhter got pregnant again and gave birth to a cute baby girl. But her husband Belal Uddin does not want to bear any expenses of Ruby Akhtar.

When she asked for something, she was beaten. So Ruby Akhtar could not bear it anymore and decided to leave her husband's house. Then Ruby Akhtar with her daughter Mushfika Nazneen Bizli goes to her father Rashid Ahmed and says I don't want to live with my husband Belal Uddin's house anymore and determined that she doesn't want to return from her father's house so Ruby Akhtar wants a small place with her father where she can live with her daughter somehow. Ruby Akhtar's father gives him a plot and on that plot his father builds a small house for Ruby Akhtar. In that hut, Ruby Akhtar's livelihood started with her daughter Bizli. Ruby Akhter works as a day laborer and lives with her daughter Bizli. Sometimes when Belal Uddin wants to see his daughter Mushfika Nazneen Bizli, Ruby Akhtar takes her daughter to meet her father and Belal Uddin hands her daughter Mushfika Nazneen Bizli 100 or 200 taka, and does not bear any other expenses. Currently, Ruby Akhter is not separated from her husband Belal Uddin.

Now, Ruby Akhtar lives in a hut with eight-year-old daughter Mushfika Nazneen Bizli. Ruby Akhter works as a day laborer to support herself and her only daughter. Her daughter is reading in class four. In such a situation, the humanitarian aid project for Rohingya and local communities implemented by PHALS funded by Australian Aid, with the support of BRAC, in June 2022, conducted a survey on the poor, widows, abandoned by husbands, disabled, elderly families, child-headed families. In the survey Ruby Akhtar's name was enlisted and was included in a livelihood training organized by PHALS. She was experienced & trained on sewing work and accordingly planned for buying a new model sewing machine. After receiving the training Ruby Akhter was given financial assistance an amount of Taka 20,000.



With the help money, Ruby Akhtar bought an electric sewing machine with 18,000 Taka and with the remaining 2,000 Taka she bought yarn, thread, scissors, etc. At present, her daily income 200-300 Tk/day. She and her daughter are living well by eating two handfuls of rice twice a day.

Ruby Akhtar wants to continue her daughter's study with the money from her sewing work and wants to spend her whole life with her daughter. Ruby Akhtar has no intention of getting married again, she wants to spend the rest of her life in sewing. She is very glad to get the opportunity and express her joy with

"My Family Maintaining Machine is Sewing Machine". She thanked PHALS and Brac for standing for the needy people, also informed and humbly request PHALS to stand beside helpless people like them in future.

"We are not excluded"-Telkhola Protibondhi Kallyan Samity

Telkhola is the most remote area of 5 No. Palongkhali Union of Ukhiya UZ. Most of the people of the villagers are poor. They live in tiny dilapidated house. It's inhabited by Muslim and ethnic group-Adibasi Chakma Samproday with a few Hindu family. Beyond this as per Persons with Disabilities database 76 Persons with Disabilities live in this ward#6 among 494 persons with disabilities in Palongkhali Union. Types of disabilities persons live in this are mostly Physical, Mental, Speech-impaired, Visually-impaired and Intellectually-impaired. These disabled persons earn their living some by begging- sometimes without eating or drinking, some by working as day laborers. Among the people only disabled persons are very neglected and deprived of different GO/NGO assistance, facilities, rights and, respect from the common people of the area.



Telkhola Protibondhi kallyan samity

Non-governmental development organization PHALS has been working in Palongkhali Union since 2020 with 'Humanitarian Assistance Project for Local People'. Due to this, PHALS has been working for better livelihood of disabled person and CBO capacity development of Palongkhali Union. Initially PHALS formed Ward disabled persons committee consisting members for awareness raising on their rights and life skill through meeting and training. But out of 76 people 6 is very minimum. They want to involve more people in the group.

As per their concern and interest Field Facilitator Md. Shafiqul Islam Khan meet with them, seat with them, discussed with them and guided to form CBO. Brac HCMP team members, PHALS Executive Director, Project team members different times visited the group and encouraged them for their good initiatives. Finally in 1, July 2021 they formed 'Telkhola Protibondhi Kallyan Samity' consisting 36 (Male-28, Female-8) disabled distressed persons from all religions with 11 members Executive Committee with the extreme support of PHALS's Field Facilitator and the organization was enrolled in PHALS. After that the President-Sagir Ahmed, General Secretary-Farid Alam, Finance Secretary-Dhiron Chakma of the Telkhola Protibondhi Kallyan Samity, along with the members of the organization, were trained by PHALS at various times to increase their capacity to manage the organization. It's very



encouraging that the president of the Protibondhi Kallyan Samity is a beggar and he begs sometimes in another area out of Palongkhali. The members of the disabled organization pay a monthly subscription of Tk 50 per month and spend it on the development and management of the organization. They becomes organized day by day.



Poultry farm

After Telkhola Protibondhi Kallyan Samity was organized, in May 2022, all the members of the association built a shelter by spending 40,000 Taka for Poultry farming.

After building the house, running the farm of the Protibondhi Kallyan Samity became very difficult for them due to lack of money. In this situation, an account payee cheque of Tk.50,000 was issued on 28-07-2022 in the name of Protibondhi Kallyan Samity by PHALS, funded by Australian Aid supported by BRAC as Mini-grant support for Disabled Persons Organizations. After receiving the money, Telkhola Protibondhi Kallyan Samity bought 50 ducks worth 30,000 Taka, spend some money for duck food & other management expenses and have 11,000 Taka in bank account for purchasing few more ducks. For continuing the farm, they linked with Upazila Livestock Office for getting technical support from them. They also have been trying to link with Upazila Social service Department and planning for its registration. By this time, all the members of the Protibondhi Kallyan samity are happy to run the duck farm after receiving the money from PHALS.

Telkhola Protibondhi Kallyan Samity's capability and skill developing day by day for the management of the ducks and planned to sell the duck eggs, deposit money in the bank and in this way the organization's farm will be much bigger, which will escape them from beggar. All the members of the Protibondhi Kallyan Samity thanked PHALS and Brac for standing beside them. Now they believe that they are not excluded from the community, nor from the Society.





Receiving Financial Support Rabeya Stood Firmly in Society



Rabeya Sultan Mayna

Rabeya Sultan Mayna (19). She was born on Ghoner Para, Phalong Khali 4 no word, Ukhiya Cox's Bazar. Her father was dead, before her berth. Rabeya didn't continue her study for poverty. Her mother used to earn a living by working in people's homes. Their life was very difficult due to poverty. Such was that times come to a marriage proposal from 2 no ward, Shialiapara, Balukhali of Ukhiya under Cox's Bazar district. On the 1st of June 2016, she was married. Her husband's name is Saiful Islam. Her married life was going well for the first few months of marriage. After a few days, her husband became addicted to the drug. And her life became miserable. If her husband couldn't manage money for inhaling Yaba, that time he used to beat Rabeya.

On 2nd February 2017, her husband stabbed her. She was seriously injured, at that time she goes to her mother's house. A few days later, her husband wants one Lac Taka as dowry. When she was not being able to pay the dowry, she was beaten again and again. As per the rural mediation Rabeya and her husband started living

together. A few days later again her husband stabbed her. At this time Rabeya was seriously injured and admitted to the hospital. Her condition was much more critical.

When she back to her mother's home, he became the plaintiff and filed a case in the "Women and Children Suppression Tribunal." Her financial condition was so poor that could not afford to prosecute the case. At that time PHALS Field Facilitators Shafiqul Islam and Farhan Akter Bizli identified Rabeya. They are talking and listening to her. And identified her needs.

They were taken to approval from the "Women and Children Welfare Committee". PHALS supported by financially ten thousand DBT (10,000) for the implementation of the legal side from the "Humanitarian Assistant for Rohingya and Host Community in Bangladesh" Project Funded by Australian Aid, in Collaboration with BRAC and Implemented by PHALS. Her legal process is continuing now. Rabeya said that:

"Thanks to PHALS for support to me. I could not go to court for money for so long. Now, I can continue my legal process smoothly. And I will reach my target. Without the support of PHALS, It was not possible for me alone. I am grateful to PHALS."

The majority of the members of the Executive Committee (EC) are social workers under a mandatory provision. Management of PHALS governed by the EC. In the EC, members are different professionals. President may Act as Honorary Chief Executive of the Organization. Executive Committee is also approved by the Directorate of Social welfare.

A total of seventy two 72 staff including part-time teachers. Male-38 & Female- 34










PHALS INCOME & EXPENDITURE 2022
