

I am contented & honored to share the annual report of PHALS for the year 2023.

Year 2023 was an exciting year for PHALS, in terms of humanitarian response to various Cyclone affected people of Cox'sBazar District by our efficient response team with limited resources. Apart from our ongoing activities there was another desired outcome of PHALS that of mainstreaming/ self-reliance initiatives for a number of Climate displaced vulnerable women residing in Govt. specialized shelter project call "Asroyon Prokolpa" and also revival of indigenous livelihood to Sea depended Ethnic community living in coastal belt of Cox'sBazar Sadar. Which focuses on our resilience as an organization and how we have apprehended opportunities and inclusion to response despite being amidst of various humanitarian crisis.

Cox'sBazar District is one of the major disaster prone district of Bangladesh It is mentionable here that due to climate change internal displacement from costal to urban area became one of the foremost hazard. With a total Bangladeshi population of district just over 2.9 million (Male Female ratio almost 50% -50%) is one of the country's least developed district so far. Approximately 33% of the population of this region are living below poverty line compared to national average of 31.5% (WB 11/2016 & CARE 2018). On the other hand the situation of District also has been compounded by almost one million FDMN (Rohinghya) which created multidimensional adverse effect to the local community.

We are so proud of the work that we have accomplished last year and are thrilled to share this healthy report with you all. None of this work would be possible without each and every one of our dedicated staff and generous supporters, Partners, different Government agencies and our Board members as well. We hope that as you read this report, you see the impact that you have had on the lives of so many affected people.

ORGANIZATION'S BRIEF

PHALS- (Program for Helpless And Lagged Society) is a non-government organization (NGO) based in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh started its journey in 1992. It is formally registered with Ministry of Social welfare in 1996 and NGO Affairs Bureau in 1999. All activities of the organization are in line with the guidance provided by the Ministry of Social Welfare (MOSW) and NGO Affairs Bureau (NGOAB) of the Government of Bangladesh. The principles, activities and approaches of PHALS correspond to national priorities for development and directly linked with current National Strategic Plan. PHALS activities have significantly contributed to attaining Millennium Development Goals (MDG) by the government, particularly Goals 1, 2, 3, 7 and 8. PHALS has developed its 2nd Strategic Plan (2022-2026) to ensure that its program interventions on education, protection, disaster risk reduction, livelihood and legal aid support implemented in Cox's Bazar district partnering with donor, development partner and government of Bangladesh that add significant values to national response for achieving Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) particularly 1, 2 4, 5, 6, 10, 13 and 17. PHALS has vibrant presence and strong footprint in emergency response program since the influx in 2017 with several interventions aligning with sectors and RRRC office as well as government of Bangladesh. Over the last 32 years PHALS has expanded its work in the area of education, protection, disaster risk reduction and livelihood including the cross-cutting issues which complementing and contributing to the national response in these areas which are under government focus.



Cox's Bazar District Intro

Cox's Bazar district is situated in the southeastern coastal area of Bangladesh. The coastal zone of Cox's Bazar has had great significance since pre-historic times for its wide diversity and abundance of natural flora and fauna. On the other hand, Cox's Bazar is also famous for its immense natural beauty with 120 km-long natural sandy beach, one of the longest in the world with population of over 2.65 million people. The economy of the coastal dwellers in Cox's Bazar combines salt production, fish and dried fish, aquaculture, agriculture, local tourism, trade and handicrafts. Sandy, sandy loamy and muddy tidal flats, mangrove vegetation, salt beds, coral reefs, salt marsh, seagrass and algal beds characterize the coastline of Cox's Bazar. These ecosystems play a principal role in supporting local communities, serving as sources of food, cash and energy. A rapid increase in population, climate change displacement and the haphazard destruction of natural habitats have resulted in the loss of coastal and terrestrial biodiversity in Cox's Bazar. Multidimensional environmental and economic adverse effect also increasing due to presence of about one million forcibly displaced Myanmar nationals (Rohingya).

Background:

Education is the key component to creating a better nation to increase the literacy rate to reasonable percentages. Considering the universal truth, PHALS has been running the pre-primary school since 1992 in Cox's Bazar. This preeducation program is especially for those children whose ages are below 6 and lack of access to education system. They become ready to enroll in school upon having the necessary preparation with their eligibility for this school. Under the supervision of 10 quality teachers the program is ongoing successfully. An average 35 students are enrolled in each school.

Outcome

In the year 2023 maintaining through all necessary measures, 329 students (boys 133 and girls

are continue pre-primary education through ten (10) preschool Centers at various location of Khuruskul, Tetuiya of Cox Bazar Sadar upazila, Chaindha, Kawarkhup and Monirjhil of Ramu Upazila. In each class there were 35 students given direct education, coaching and psychosocial support in order to assist children's development in the area of cognitive and psycho-social development. PHALS supported these students with learning materials, stationery items and management s salaries for teachers. In 2023, the passing rate is 96% and enrollment in primary school rate 95%. The students enrolled in different Govt and non-government schools and institution after the completion of the pre-primary school examination.

Challenges

Pre-primary education is an ongoing process. Maintaining the continuos presence and reducing the drop out rate including crisises of fund, natural calamities and parent's lack of awareness.

Mitigation Strategies

PHALS attempts have been made to conduct regular parents-teacher's meeting and communication with communities for increasing/securing fund availability.

Background:

To decrease the dropout, rate up to a reasonable percentage as far as primary education is concern. The main target group is vulnerable poor children. They are supported with all kinds of educational materials and school dress to overcome their obstacle in the field of education. The education support is given the free cost for the children. The experienced teachers are providing education to the students.

Main Activities:

PHALS provides all necessary educational materials for poor students. Six teachers are continuing this school with utmost dedication. Commitment and excellent education quality.

They teach through "learning with fun" methodology and teaching techniques. This school provides a joyful environment for children.

Outcome

From December to January 2022, 150 Students have been admitted to the school. 90 male students and 60 female students. Primary to High School Enrollment 22 Students including 8 boys & 14 girls.

Challenge

Parents mentality to earn by children due to the poverty and lack of awareness on education resulted in declining students enrollment.

Overcome

PHALS visited children's house to house to highlight the importance of education to the parents to increase their awareness level which resulting the number of students was increased and the relationships between teacher's and parents has been developed more.

Project Goal:

The project has the potential and impact-full of mainstreaming orphans and street children. Their basic needs are met & they will get new life through gaining knowledge, vocational skills, and life skills. They will get love and affection like parents. It will boost their confidence. They will become good assets to the community. They are developed physically & psychologically & made as a good & protective citizen. By being observed in philanthropy and social activities they will also be like that in the longer future.

Project Objective:

- To provide orphan/semi orphan/street children, a childhood that they never experienced and help them to become useful members of society.
- To encourage orphan/semi orphan/street children to kind their potential by providing creative opportunities.
- To make available a secure place where orphan/semi orphan/street children can play and enjoy their childhood.
- To provide basic education to orphan/semi orphan/street children.
- To provide such welfare services as free lodging, boarding, health, and recreation.

- To provide basic literacy and facilities for those who wish to study further.
- To select and prepare for a vacation to live on their legs.
- To accomplish physical, intellectual, and aesthetic development of the children.

Main Activities

BANI STREET has expertise in the accompaniment and support of minors in a situation of precariousness in cox's Bazar. The goal is not to provide one-time emergency assistance but rather to offer personalized assistance that is global and sustainable.

With the opening of this structure, BANI STREET and PHALS aim to reduce the number of abuses on Bangladeshi children at risk by contributing to the change in mentality and establishing a structure ensuring their protection. The structure is expected to accommodate up to 48 Bangladeshi children under optimal conditions ensuring their development in a safe environment. Children will be admitted between the age of 6 and 14, and they could be taken care of until the age of 23.

Outcome

29 children (20 girls and 9 boys), staying at PHALS-BANI Academy shelter home are being provided with all facilities including food and shelter through the activities of the project. All children are studying in different grades from 1st to 12th grades. All children have made good results in the annual exam this year. Shahina of grade 10 has obtained 2nd position in her class. Riya Moni of grade 9 has obtained A+ in the exam and Shahed of the same grade has stood first in boys' section. Sumaiya has stood first in the annual of exam. Three children, Josna, Riya and Rekha have passed HSC this year and they are getting prepared for higher education. Nureja has passed SSC this year and got admitted to college. Among the children staying at PHALS Bani Academy, three children have participated in the 2nd Sheikh Kamal Jubo Games and



Taniya was selected for national level competition. Taniya won 2nd prize in national level competition held on 26 February 2023. Five children (Riya-1, Rekha, Rajiya, Taniya & Sadia) have achieved black belts & three children (Josna, Nureja & Shahina) have achieved red belts in Taekwondo this year. In January 2023, the team of PHALS BANI Academy became champion in Inter School Badminton tournament-2023. In Annual Sports events of Cox's Bazar International School, Rajiya and Shahina have got three prizes. Maliya, Alvi, Reshmi and Jihad have got two prizes each. Taniya, Sadia, Riya, Shahed, Fazilatunnesa, Adiba, Sumaiya and Rishat have got one prize each.

Education

At present there are 29 children in PHALS-BANI Academy. Most of them study in Cox's Bazar International school & PHALS Tayama Primary School. They get a good and standard education there. They also take part in extra-curricular activities there.

There are two residential assistants and three tutors in PHALS-BANI Academy. The English teacher and the science teacher teach children 6 hours a day, 6 days a week, according to class

routine. Special classes of Spoken English are also conducted by the English teacher. Religion teacher teaches religious topics.

Three students, Josna, Riya Moni and Rekha Moni have recently passed higher secondary exam. They are now taking preparation for admission to higher education. Nuraja is a student of HSC first year in Cox's Bazar City College. She is studying in Business Management group. Rajia is an SSC examinee this year. She studies in science group. There are three students in class 10 now. They were in class 9 last year. Among them, Shahina and Tania got 2nd and 4th positions respectively in last annual exam. The other student, Sadia also made a good result.

Riya Moni was in class 8 last year. She is studying in class 9 now. She secured the highest grade, A+ in last annual exam. Shahed too was in class 8 last year. In last annual exam, he stood first in boys' section. He is in class 9 now. Maliya was in class 7 last year. She is now in class 8. Three students have been promoted from class 6 to class 7. They are Tanha, Mobina and Arman.

Three other students named Shamsunnahar, Sumaiya and Munni are now in class 6. Among them, Sumaiya stood first in last Annual exam. Shahin & Akila are in class 5 now. Adiba, Rishat, Fazilatunnesa, Reshmi, Alvi, Jihad, Yahidu & Sami are in class four now. Their results in last annual exam are good. Tasfia is in class three now. He made a good result in last annual exam.

The youngest student of PHALS-BANI Academy is Labib. He is in class 2 now. He has learnt to read and write quite well after coming to PHALS-BANI Academy. After all, all the students of PHALS-BANI Academy are gradually improving in studies as well as extra-curricular activities.

Children's Achievement on Annual Sports and Cultural Events

The children of PHALS-BANI Academy are very good at sports and cultural programs. In sports & cultural ceremony of Cox's Bazar International School held on January 2023, Rajiya obtained 1st position in balance race and 2nd position in poem recitation. Taniya obtained 1st position in musical chair game. Shahina obtained 2nd position in musical chair game and 3rd position

in balance race. In Quran recitation, Sadia obtained 2nd position and Shahed obtained 3rd position. Riya Moni obtained 1st position in balance race and Maliya 2nd position. In primary section, Sumaiya obtained 1st position in balance race, Reshmi 2nd position and Fazilatunnesa 3rd position. In race, Jihad became first and Rishat became 2nd. In rope jump, Reshmi became 1st and Adiba 2nd. In Islamic song competition, Jihad became 1st, Alvi became 2nd and Sumaiya 3rd. Alvi also obtained 1st position in Quran recitation. Thus, the children of PHALS-BANI Academy are doing well in extra-curricular activities.

Food

Children is residing in PHALS - BANI Academy homes are provided with healthy and nutritious food. A separate food timetable is prepared based on the liking of the children and also

considering the health of the children. Once a week beef is cooked for the children. Moreover, in the evening the children are given seasonal fruits which give them good health. Every day the children are provided snacks as per the food timetable in the evening.

Beautiful kitchen and dining setup on 4th floor of PHALS-BANI Academy from February 2023. Before this, the kitchen of PHALS Training Center was used.

Medical Support

PHALS-BANI Academy provides medical assistance in addition to other support. The two resident assistants took constant care. If any of the children fell sick, we immediately consulted the doctor on duty at the FPAB clinic nearest to the academy. And take medicines as advised. facilitators make sure they are followed up in the coming days. In special cases, have been referred to a specialized adjacent doctor. The facilitators are always ready to extend their support for any medication they need with the expert.

About Project

Since January 2021 PHALS has been implementing the ToGETHER project technical guided by Malteser International funded. With the financial support of the German Foreign Office, Welthungerhilfe and its consortium partners Caritas Germany, Diakonie Katastrophenhilfe and Malteser International are implementing the ToGETHER program (Towards Greater Effectiveness and Timeliness in Humanitarian Emergency Response) which supports localized humanitarian action in eight countries, including Bangladesh. The three-year program aims

to offer an opportunity to forty local or national organizations in 8 participating countries to jointly develop and undertake capacity strengthening and exchange measures to reinforce their institutional and operational capacity to effectively respond to humanitarian crises.

Background

Cox's Bazar district is globally recognized for several reasons, including its distinction as one of the world's longest sea beaches, a lengthy coastline, and its vulnerability to various hazards. Notably, the district has gained international attention for hosting over one million forcibly displaced Myanmar nationals, specifically the

Rohingya community, who have sought refuge since 2017. Recently, on May 14, 2023, Cyclone Mocha made landfall in Cox's Bazar, resulting in significant damage and casualties. Reference by Bangla Live News date on 15May 2023: The news says that Cox's Bazar District Commissioner Muhammad Shaheen Imran said, Cyclone Mocha has damaged 12,000 houses in Cox's Bazar district. Of these, 10,000 were partially damaged and 2,000 were completely damaged. In response to this humanitarian crisis, the local humanitarian actor, PHALS, has expressed a keen interest in providing assistance to the affected community in collaboration with BRAC. The proposed project aims to offer a range of humanitarian services to approximately 155 affected households from Whyong and Palongkhali union of Cox's Bazar district, who experienced

the adverse impacts of the MOCHA cyclone. These services include house repairs, improvement of water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) facilities, infrastructure development, livelihood support.

Objective

To recover the loses and damages of the Mocha affected people in Whykong area under Teknaf and Thankhali area under Ukhai Upazila of Cox's Bazar district, technical supported by brac Programme for Helpless And Lagged Societies (PHALS) will take project activities after completion the project preparatory work. Beginning of the project activities staff will be oriented on project modalities, will be conducted Final Inclusive Assessment for Beneficiaries selection and Baseline data by surveyors, will be conducted 2 Inception Meetings at Whykong and Palongkhali Unions, Organize one day training for staff PSEA, Safeguarding and CRM and 1 day training on Gender Mainstreaming and Person with Disability inclusion.

To meet the project

outcome-1: Households actively practicing in their new livelihoods' activities.

Output-1.1: Households received Livelihood losses items (poultry, chicken, duck, fisheries, sampling, crops etc.) following activities will be implemented;

Activity-1.1.1: Provide poultry (Hen and duckling) engaging with community people. The women, especially women headed family members and affected by the mocha cyclone will get this support, in total 30 women from different family will receive Poultry (Hen and Duckling) support.

Activity-1.1.2: Provide Livestock (Goat) engaging with community people. The women especially who are widow or separated and have person with disability family members and affected by mocha cyclone will get this support. In total, 20 women will receive Livestock (Goat/Calf) support.

Immediate Outcome-3. Households have access to improve disaster resilient WASH systems and infrastructure development

Output-3.1: Households Repaired and reconstructed of damaged houses, sanitary latrine and tube-wells with raised platform. Following activities will be implemented;




Activity-3.1.5: Repair out of order tubewell with platform construction. In total 10 tubewells which are required to renovate the platform as well as required for repair and uses by many family members will be repaired.

Activity-3.1.6: Renovate the pathway to move for sanitary latrine or water collection from tube-well. The road/path if it is difficult to fetch water from tube-well or use sanitary latrine in total 10 paths will be renovated or constructed. **Activity-3.1.7:** Setup signboard after completion

Activity-3.1.7: Setup signboard after completion of infrastructure. After the completion of the newly setup, renovated, repaired of new house House-15, repairing-25, new toilet -20, Repairing toilet-20, Renovated Tubewell -10, In total 90 Signboards will be fixed or hanged.

Moreover, to ensure quality of project activities and Accountability there will be invited to conduct Field monitoring by Local Administration/Senior Management and will be conducted post distribution monitoring by surveyors.

Challenges, Lessons Learned

Challenges Faced: During the implementation phase PHALS team faced a few challenges and solved with innovative ideas and approaches which helped a lot to implement the project activities successfully. Examply-

- **Legal Documentation Changes:** Changes in legal requirements for new house eligibility posed a challenge, requiring adjustments to the project plan.
- **Solution:** Strengthen communication channels with local authorities for real-time updates on legal criteria changes, ensuring swift adjustments to project plans.
- **Unforeseen Beneficiary Changes:** The sudden death of a beneficiary led to the need for plan adjustments, impacting the original design.

- **Solution:** Regular monitoring and engagement with the community to identify changes promptly. Develop contingency plans for unforeseen events affecting beneficiaries.

Lessons Learned

Through the journey of implementation PHALS team learned a lot about which factors can impact the implementation effectively at the whole life of project. Out of these a few learnings are as follows

- Flexibility and Adaptability
- Stakeholder Communication
- Comprehensive Risk Management.

Output 1: Partner organizations establish linkages with universities, colleges, organizations, government agencies, and other relevant information sources to develop a cohesive, coherent development approach based on factual information about climate resilience and adaptive technologies.

Activity-1.1: Partner organizations cooperate with universities, colleges and agricultural offices and train personnel

Through establishing collaboration with the institute of Disaster Management and Vulnerability Studies (IDMVS), University of Dhaka, Bangladesh conducted "A Study on Climate Change and Livelihood Adaptation for coastal based community people especially climate refugee and ethnic minority and local surrounding vulnerable communities in Khuruskul and Chowfaldandi areas of Cox's Bazar Sadar".

We also bulid up strong network, linkage and collaboration with Union Parishad, UZ and District administration, Government Officials from department of DRR, Agriculture, Livestock, Social Welfare, Fisheries, Women Affairs, Forest, Fire Service Station, Education, Cooperative, Women Entrepreneurs, different NGO, private and public representatives, Local stakeholders for smooth operation of the project activities.

Activity-1.2: Conducting studies, pilot studies, tests or practical investigations

Conducted A Study on Climate Change and Livelihood Adaptation for coastal based community people especially focusing on climate refugee and ethnic minority and local surrounding vulnerable communities in Khuruskul and Chowfaldandi areas of Cox's Bazar Sadar. The study conducted by the institute of Disaster Management and Vulnerability Studies (IDMVS), University of Dhaka, Bangladesh leaded by Mohammed Moniruzzaman Khan, Ph.D in May 2023.

The recommendations of the study are based on the opinions of the community people and key informant interviewers. They are as followings –

• Government and non-government organizations should invest more in climate adaptation

and mitigation strategies in the area and adopt an "innovative approach" catered towards the most vulnerable communities.

- A range of training programs with a special focus on women and other socially excluded groups i.e., ethnic minority, persons with disability should be carried out. The training programs may include following trainings –
- Training on preparing handicraft (for women)
- Training on boutique (for women)
- Training on parlour skills (for women)
- Training on tourism and hospitality manage ment (for both men and women).
- Training on tailoring (for women)
- Training on ICT i.e., mobile repair (for both women and men)
- Training on livestock rearing (for both women and men)
- nterventions such as small business support or monitored cash grant for predefined support (buying autorickshaw/CNG) will also be helpful.
- The interventions must work on all fronts of resilient livelihood. Specific actions include –
- Livelihood Protection Establishing dams/ polders to protect against the sudden surge of water in selected places.
- Livelihood Promotion Cutting the middle man off by linking the producer with the distribution directly or helping them open their own distribution house.
- Livelihood Diversification Diversifying livelihood opportunities through training.
- Livelihood Transformation Transforming the livelihood practices of certain communities through imparting skills and training.
- There is an unexplored possibility of private sector engagement in climate change adaption where the big corporations of this area support the most vulnerable groups through their CSR and undertaking training programs to employ people from the poorer community.



- All the anti-environment activities i.e., deforestation and hill cutting must be stopped through executing legal and regulatory frameworks and a continuous attempt of advocacy with the policy makers must be carried out to obtain political commitment.
- All the relevant stakeholders must be sensitized about the climate crisis and equitable climate responsive measures for including this agenda of climate change in their routine and special interventions.

Activity-1.3: Disseminate results at the local level and incorporate results into livelihood development support.

Study finding sharing workshop on "Climate change adaptation for coastal community" at Cox's Bazar held with the cooperation of Malteser international on the 10th June'23 at Cox's Bazar Sadar Upazila Conference Room. A total of 35 participants attend in the workshop. Study team from Institute of Disaster Management & Vulnerability studies of Dhaka University conducted the study in Cox's Bazar Sadar Upazila, specially at Khurushkul and Chowfaldandi Unions working area of PHALS BMZ project. Concern Union Parishad Chairman, Government Officials from department of Agriculture, Livestock, Social Welfare, Fisheries, Women Affairs, Forest, MI representative, Women Entrepreneurs, different NGO representatives, Local stakeholders provided their valuable feedback on study.

On 13th Nov'23 Honorary Executive Director Mr. Abu Murshed Chowdhury handed over the research /study report to the Deputy Commissioner of Cox's Bazar Mr. Md. Shaheen Imran on climate change & livelihood adaptation for coastal based community people which specially focused on climate displaced people living in Govt. Shelter project of Khuruskul and Ethnic minority of Chowfaldandi living in coastal riverine of Cox's Bazar supported by Malteser International.

Based on the study findings PHALS incorporated the following ativities in change proposal-

- Skill development training: Organize disaster Pre-preparedness and doings during disaster awarness session with UDMC members
- Provide training SRG members on Gender Mainstreaming & Disability Inclusion
- Taken initiative for Message delivery regarding awareness raising of the community people through Courtyard meeting and SRGs meeting on
- Cultivation/promotion of homestead vegetable
- Promotion of IGA through Poultry/Livestock rearing
- Network/Liasion with other GO/NGO/Private sector for involvement of vulnerable youth in catering, mobile repair/mechanical training, tourism and hospitality management training.

On the 7th September'23 Apex Body formation meeting held at Chowfaldandi Southpara, and on the 18th October'23 and 10th December'23 Bi-Monthly Apex Body Meeting held at Khuruskul and Chowfaldandi resource center respectively. 5 leaders from each SRG are the members of this Apex Body. A total of 87 Female participants attend in the 3 meeting. In the meeting they introduced themselves, formed an Executive Committee of the Apex Body consisting 7 members (One from each SRG) through open discussion.

Bulid network with different market channel etc.

Activity-2.3: Support given to SHG members to ensure quality product for 6 months including training by 5 Instructor/Expert.

To ensure quality production of SRG members PHALS recruited 3 Instructors a) Instructor-Tailoring, b) Instructor-Block/Batick and c) Instructor-Embroidery following Instructor recruitment related circular on the 20th September'23. 2 resource person assist us through the whole process of written test, practical and voce test. They have been providing support to the SRG members to becomes trend on the respective trade for quality production. 2 instructor on Handicraft and Handloom will be recruited in 2024. The 3 instructors started trade wise training from November 2023 with 132 SRG members (Tailoring-44, Embroidery-45 and Block-Batik-43). In 2023 they provided training for 2 months (November and December) only.

Activity-2.4: Provide training on Block, Batik, Hand Painting for 35 (5X7) of Climate Refugee, Ethnic Minority, and Vulnerable host community Training on Block-Batik, Hand Painting for the Climate Refugee, Ethnic Minority and Vulnerable host community of Khuruskul and Chowfaldandi started on November'23. 43 Female participants have been receiving the training in 3 Resorce Center.

- Came forward to benefit the local people during the calamity.
- Requested to provide name of the candidates participation details of the person involved in such activities and photographs (if possible) of the participation in the activities should be sent to the Project Coordinator-BMZ PT Project, PHALS. The champion will be declared after scrutinizing by the organization (Involving UP Chairman, ED) and the champion will be awarded with crest and prize at Union Disaster management committee meeting.

Based on that we selected 3 Champions in

Climate Resilience considering their involvement in WDMC, UDMC, CPP, different Day observation, Disaster response in their community, networking/collaboration with different DMC's, UP, UZ representatives, Local administration, tree plantation. UP Chairman, Counselor, UP members act as selection members with organization's ED. Finally, 2 champions have been selected from Chowfaldandi and 1 Champion selected from Khuruskul. On the 26th December'23 they have been awarded with crest and prize in PHALS Head Office.

About Project

Cox's Bazar is a district located in the south-eastern part of Bangladesh. The area of Cox's Bazar especially Ukhia and Teknaf upazila has been experienced a large influx of Rohingya refugees since August 2017, due to persecution upon Rohingya Community in Myanmar. Now the refugee camp in Cox's Bazar is the largest camp

in the world, hosting over 1100,000 refugees. The influx of refugees has been put a strain on the resources of the host community and disrupted the education system in the area. Many Rohingya children have lack of access to quality education, with limited learning spaces, resources, and qualified teachers. Continuing the education of Rohingya children is now very essential following Myanmar curriculum with their own language from their children's early childhood development. Funded by Pooled Fund, technical supported BRAC the PHALS intended education support project with Community Based Learning Facilities in Camp -10 in Palongkhali union of Ukhia Upazila under Cox's Bazar district.

Under the project, 168 students (Girl-92 and 76 Boys) whose age 3-5 years will be enrolled with quality education by 10 teachers (7 Rohing-ya and 3 host teachers.) To give support and



•monitoring the project activities along with project staff, Community Based Learning Facility Management Committees will be involved. The project duration is one year but extendable upon implementing partner and donor agreement as education is living project.

This project aims to improve quality education for FDMN children in camp -10, Ukhiya Cox's Bazar district which is stood by five expected result viz.

- 1. Quality education for 168 Forcibly Displaced Myanmar Nationals children in camp-4 Ext, Cox's Bazar Enrolled,
- 2. Learning Centre 10 teachers' skill and capacity enhanced,
- 3. Awareness on Social psychology of 168 Forcibly Displaced Myanmar Nationals Students increased,
- 4. Community engagement and participation for quality education of 168 Forcibly Displaced Myanmar Nationals students ensured, and 5. Coordination and correlation with other actors, GoB as well increased.

Goal

To support the FDMN children in achieving universal education through accessibility, quality assurance, community engagement and system strengthening.

Objectives

- i. Expanding and strengthening immediate access to equitable learning opportunities in a safe and protective environment for crisis-affected refugee girls and boys aged 3-5 years old;
- ii. Providing quality inclusive education to refugee.
- iii. Ensuring refugee ownership and active participation and engagement;

- On 9-10 August 2023, during flood flash in Cox's Bazar, PHALS collaborated with local administration distributed dried food among 1000 families (per family Flatter rice 250gr, Pupped rice 250gr, Water 1.50 litre, Biscuit 250gr, Sugarcane molasses 250gr) in Pakua and Chakaria Upazila.
- On 3 Oct 2023 post distribution monitoring conducted headed by Mr Akhyai Mong Marma (A MonG) at Konakhali union under Chakaria Upazila, Cox's Bazar.



During the monitoring visit, there were conducted three Focus Group Discussions. 1. Female Group, 2. Male Group and 3. Mix Group. Usually PDM conducts organization contingency plan and SoP after distribution of any kits/kind support among the community. The objective of the PDM was to know the relief receiver information, distribution process, about the flood situation, utilization of the support and feedback/complain/opinion/suggestions.

- On 7 December 2023, 60 affected families in Kudubdia Para, Samitee Para under Cox's Bazar Purasabha who were affected by cyclone Hamoon received household utensils as pitchers-1, mug-1, rice pot-1, curry pot-1, jug-1, water pot (Bodna)-1 from PHALS. During the distribution Pourasava ward commissioner 1,2,3, Shahena Akter Pakhi Pakhi and PHALS EC Board Member A K M Mahtabul Islam were present.

Saidul Islam Sami (10) is physically handicapped by birth. His left leg is missing below the knee since birth. Sami is the first child of daily laborer Nasir Uddin and Shakila, a resident of Larpara, bus terminal of Cox's Bazar city. Nasir Uddin could not afford Sami's education and expensive medical expenses due to his low income. PHALS-BANI Academy received Samir's information, after the Academy's due process, Sami was admitted to PHALS-BANI Academy Shelter Home, where he is receiving Food, Shelter, education, treatment and everything else. Following the application, "Shriners Hospital for Children" located in the city of Honolulu, Hawaii, USA, took responsibility for the treatment of Sami's feet along with all the expenses. Saidul Islam Sami and PHALS-BANI Academy Project Manager Rasadul Islam Shohel left for America on December 10 with Singapore Airlines.

On December 26, 2023, Dr. Anu and his expert team at Shriner's Hospital for Children, Hawaii completed Sami's successful leg and hand surgery. It will take 1.5 to 2 months for him to fully recover. Later, he will have a prosthetic leg attached to his left leg to allow him to walk and play sports normally.

He is in class Three in the PHALS- Taiyama Primary School.

He Says,

"After my treatment, I will be able to walk and play sports like everyone else, so I am very happy. I will be grateful to PHALS-BANI Academy for providing such good treatment for me. I want to study and become a doctor to treat children like me."

Rozina dreams to be a Successful Entrepreneur

Rozina Akhter age 36 years, her father's name is Dudu Mia and mother's name is Laila Begum, lives in Khurushkul Ashryon Prokalpo. After marriage her married life was happy. After 7 years of marriage Rozina gave birth to a beautiful daughter. Husband Shah Alam could not

accept her to give birth to a daughter. Husband Shah Alam wanted to be the father of a son. So husband Shah Alam developed a love relationship with another girl. Her husband Shah Alam had an almost daily quarrel with Rozina Akhtar for telling her that he was in love with another girl and at one point her husband Shah Alam beat up Rozina Akhtar. Unable to bear the violence, Rozina moved to her father Dudu Mia's house at times of her 6 month's old daughter. After Rozina moved to her father's house, husband Shah Alam entered into a second marriage and sent divorce papers to Rozina Akhtar.

After divorcing, Rozina Akhter filed a case in the name of her husband Shah Alam. But Rozina Akhter did not get any benefit from filing the case, because the case was defeated by Shah Alam Tucker. In a cruel twist of fate, Rozina took refuge from her father Dudu Mia with her daughter. At present, Rozina Akhter with her 7 years old daughter is living in Sampan building Room-505 in Khurushkul Ashrayon Prokalpo near her father Dudu Mia.

In this situation, under Resilience Strengthening of Vulnerable Populations in northern, western and eastern Bangladesh through a Network Approach of 5 Partner Organizations project implemented by the non-governmental development organization PHALS supported by Malteser International, implementation of various development works in Khurushkul Union and Chowfaldandi Union of Cox's Bazar district with poor families, ultra-poor families, widows and abandoned families. In 2023, beneficiary survey for the project was started, at one stage of the survey Rozina Akhter's name was included. Non-governmental development organization PHALS tailoring, embroidery established block-batik training in Khuruskul Ashrayon Prokalpo Resource Center and begin technical and financial support for the helpless unemployed family members in the society. Rozina Akhtar is taking training on tailoring in the said training center.

Rozina Akhter said that she has been feeling

comfort by receiving training on tailoring from PHALS supported by Malteser International's training center close to her house with no cost. Among the participants she is the best performer. Her sewing quality is very good. From the SRG members group savings they will buy required equipment & produce quality products and sell it to the market for better livelihood. She also wants to take rent a shop at their Ashrayon Prokalpo for maintaining her household expenses independently.

She expressed her thoughts to be a successful entrepreneur, her cute girl child will be educated and she hopes to establish in the society. She thanked the non-governmental development organization PHALS for standing beside the climate migrated people and their unemployed family members to becomes financially independent in the society.

Jesmin Akter lives in Chowfaldandi Bazarpara, Ward#2 of Chowfaldandi Union. She is 22 years of old. Her father's name is Muhammad Nabi and mother late Sabe Meraj. She is the youngest among three brothers and sisters. Jasmin Akhtar has two brothers.



The elder brother is mentally disabled, second brother works as a day laborer. When Jesmin Akter was one and a half years old Jasmine Akhter's mother Sabe Meraj died. A year after her mother's death father Mohammad Nabi remarried and left the children. After Jasmine Akhter's father Mohammad Nabi married her another three brothers and sisters became orphans. Then Jesmin Akter Akhter and two brothers were brought up in the house of their grandparents.

Jesmin Akter is currently living in different relatives and neighbor's houses. Jasmin Akhter's elder brother is a disabled person who wanders on the streets, Mej's brother is married and living separately. She becomes helpless with her younger brother and sister along with person with her disable elder brother.

At that time, with the support of Malteser International non-governmental organization PHALS conducted a survey for "Resilience Strengthening of Vulnerable Populations in Northern, Western and Eastern Bangladesh through a Network Approach of 5 Partner Organization" project's beneficiary selection in April-May 2023 at Chowfaldandi Union of Cox's Bazar Sadar UZ, Cox's Bazar district. The name of orphan Jesmin Akter of Bazarpara, Chowfaldandi Union was included in the survey on behalf of her elder brother as the family member of Persons with Disability. And finally she was selected for Block-Batik training considering her family's vulnerability. After that Jasmin Akhtar started Block-Batik training at Chowfaldandi-1 Resource Center for three months from November 2023.

Jasmin Akhtar regularly comes to the training center, carefully receives the training both practical and theoretical. Her training performance is better than others. Besides the Trainer she was found to help others for their better understanding. She can tie the knot properly and color combination/mixing performance is very good. Now, Jesmin Akter can complete the Block-Batik work very well and hope that if everything is okay then she will be able to maintain her living with her persons with disable elder brother &

other family members in a better way by producing different types and designs Block-Batik product as per market demand of Cox's Bazar. Regarding this initially she seeks support from Self Resilience Group (SRG) leader and Project Marketing Officer. She thanked PHALS and Malteser International for standing beside the persons with disability family for creating the options and dreaming for a better livelihood.

"My dream is no far away" -Hadisa Mukarrama

Mukarrama is the second girl in the family of four brothers and sisters. She is 24 Years old. Her father's name is late Samsul Alam, mother's name is Mortuza Begum. Once she lived in Samitipara, Dalam Kutubdiapara, Ward No. 1, Cox's Bazar Municipality.

Due to poverty, parents gave her in marriage while she was adolescent of 15 years. Hadisa has 2 children, a 7 years old boy named Habibur Rahman Raihan and a 3 years girl named Hadisa Yasmin Riya. Before Hadisa Yasmin Riya's birth the carpenter husband, died of strangulation in 2019. Father Shamsul Alam died 15 days after her husband's death. After that, Hadisa Mukarrama started living in her mother's house with her 2 small children. Her elder brother Md. Ashek used to work in a shop and support the family but after his marriage the elder brother got separated. Later, younger brother Md. Shaheen took over the family by running a small tea shop in Asharyan Prokalpo. There was another younger sister in the family Mubaraka Akhter who married her sister with difficulty. Hadisa Mukarrama's family currently has 5 members and residing in Probal building Room# 408 of Khurushkul Ashrayon Prokalpo

In this situation, with the support of Malteser International under the BMZ-PT project implemented by the non-governmental organization PHALS started beneficiary selection survey at Khuruskul Ashrayon Prokalpo of Khurushul Union of Cox's Bazar Sadar UZ for the project to find out landless families, abandoned husbands, person with disabilities, widows and poor family members etc in April 2023. Hadisa Mukarrama enlisted as a beneficiary in Embroidery trade. PHALS established a Resource Center in Khurushkul Ashrayon Prokalpo and started training in November 2023 in Tailoring, Embroidery and Block-Batik trade. She started the training activity in embroidery trade at the said training center. From the beginning she attentively attend the training, follows the instruction of the Instructor. She is an advance trainee. Quality of her work is the best among the group.

Seeing her embroidery products her family members, training participants, instructor are very happy. Besides her self-training she helps other participants to know the ins and out of the training for their improvement. Now, she has been enjoying the training, increased her confident for better livelihood and started planning for her

future. Hadisa Mukarrama says-"my dream is no far away" and hoped to establish a shop in the local market beside her SRG. 
EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE Project


